Dock Lines

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Surprise Creation and Inaugural Sail of the TYC *"Suicide Club"*

The Sunday of the Leukemia Cup Regatta on Carlyle Lake started with the prospect of storms in the weather allegations. The first hints of rain started early, but cleared out in time for the first set of races to be completed. But by noon, the storms moved back in and came across the lake in succession, with little time between downpours. The races were curtained and the racing declared finished shortly thereafter. TYC boats, Miss-B -Haven, NaBoLisK and Hog Wild were still at CSA, Tony DiMercurio, Bob Howard and I regularly talking about when we could maybe make the sail back, none of us really wanting to leave our boats at CSA overnight.

Tony and Bob had to skipper their own boats alone, while I had the advantage of having my great friend, Karen Morris with me. A watch of the little radar display in the bottom corner of a couple local TV stations showed a break in the weather coming by 3:30 in the afternoon, so we all headed to our boats and took off for home. The wind was blowing fairly well from the S/E, at around 15 knots, but seemed to be pretty steady. The sailing from the CSA harbor and up to Allen's Branch was spirited, but not extreme by anyone's opin-

ion. Those conditions didn't last as we three TYC boats sailed further north.

The last of the storms had seemed to pass off and head east from the lake while we sailed, but the winds started to pick-up in speed and swung over to come out of the east. It wasn't long before all three boats were heeled well over and keeping control was getting to be a challenge. The wind got the waves building and it wasn't long before the lake turned angry with white-caps on every wave.

By the time our TYC fleet rounded the point to turn towards home, it seemed like all hell had broken loose with 4–5 foot waves and the winds howling through the rigging. Tony and Bob had a very difficult time trying to keep their boats under control and at times, while Karen and I had it a little easier with two of us on board to take care of sailing the boat. Tony let his headsail loose and managed to get the mainsail down before Miss -B found the rocks. Bob had it the worst, letting his jib sheets loose, only to have them go into the water and get wrapped around the prop. Barely making the harbor, Karen and I breathed easier to find the docks lined with TYC folks ready to help us get to a dock-any dock as we were still fighting the winds even inside the harbor. We managed to get to the end of E dock with help and got Hog Wild secured. While that was happening, Todd Miller, Craig Swann, Dan Sargent and Steve Hollingsworth had taken off in Todd's power boat are were making their way out to assist Tony and Bob. Tony had managed to get his

in need. Fortunately, Bob was able to keep his boat from further harm and rocks as the winds finally dropped to manageable levels. A short tow later, all three TYC boats were then back home and secured.

Lessons learned numbered in the dozens, but the conditions faced were also very uncommon. Through both Tony's and Bob's experiences, the conditions we dealt with that day were the worst ever they'd seen on Carlyle Lake. We can look back and take note that none of us panicked and did what needed to be done to get home safe. We can



look to the fantastic attitude and willingness to help each other from everyone at the marina that day, especially Todd, Danny, Craig and Steve and




